#### **GHIAA History**

In 2016, leaders from faith communities across Greater Hartford gathered to envision a broad-based social justice

initiative. The goal was to create a diverse organization of lay leaders and clergy, crossing lines of race, class, gender, religion, and geography, to build relational power to make change in our communities. Out of this process was born the Greater Hartford Interfaith Action Alliance (GHIAA), which launched officially in 2019.

## **GHIAA** Organizing

We follow the principles and practices of faith-based relational organizing, grounded in a clear commitment to

antiracism. We believe that deep and authentic relationships are the foundation of all we do. Therefore, we begin by listening to people's stories. From there, we identify shared themes in our struggles. We distill broad, nebulous problems into specific, concrete issues where we can use our collective power to create systemic change. We analyze power, act strategically, and evaluate our campaigns to learn from our successes and failures. We are always seeking to connect with new communities as we build power and make change.



### **GHIAA** Impact

Since our founding, GHIAA leaders and our allies have achieved wins on many critical issues:

- Criminal Justice: passing clean slate legislation
- **Poverty**: eliminating welfare liens statewide
- **Racial Justice**: declaring racism as a public health crisis in our state
- **Housing**: relocating 240 families from inhumane conditions in the North End of Hartford and holding slumlords accountable for the harm done
- **Gun Violence**: allocating state funds for violence prevention and intervention
- Education: increasing equity in public schools by fully funding the ECS formula
- **Mental Health**: expanding HUSKY access for income-eligible people, regardless of immigration status
- Environmental Justice: establishing oversight and funding for remediation of the former MIRA trash-to-energy plant in Hartford's South Meadows
